Eagle Project Reviews are held in conjunction with District Roundtables on the 1 st Tuesday of each Month with the exception of July. Reviews begin at 7:00 p.m.

Scouts seeking reviews are selected in random order, i.e. there is no reason to arrive early in order to be first in line.

### **Cooking Merit Badge**

Be advised the the requirements for the cooking merit badge have recently changed.

After being completely revised in 2014, some requirements for Cooking merit badge were further revised on January 1, 2016. However, each version of the requirements prohibited meals prepared for the merit badge to also be used for rank requirements and using meals prepared for rank advancement for the merit badge requirements.

The paragraph in the current requirements is as follows:

"Note: The meals prepared for Cooking merit badge requirements 4, 5, and 6 will count only toward fulfilling those requirements and will not count toward rank advancement or other merit badges. Meals prepared for rank advancement or other merit badges may not count toward the Cooking merit badge. You must not repeat any menus for meals actually prepared or cooked in requirements 4, 5, and 6."

Unit leaders and Cooking merit badge counselors should be aware of this statement and make sure Scouts are receiving the full benefit of both the rank advancement and merit badge programs.

### **Duty To God**

Effective January 1, 2016 Boy Scout ranks from Tenderfoot through Eagle include the requirement to "tell how you have done your duty to God."

This new requirement has raised numerous questions, especially regarding how it should be accomplished. The National Council, in its December 2015 Advancement News, published as an addition to the FAQs covering all of the new requirements a statement to provide guidance to unit leaders and Boards of Review. 

### **Duty to God**

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This new requirement has raised numerous questions, especially regarding how it should be accomplished. The National Council, in its December 2015 Advancement News, published as an addition to the FAQs covering all of the new requirements the following statement to provide guidance to unit leaders and Boards of Review:

Q. The article in Sept/Oct 2015 Advancement News, page 4, "Scout Spirit and Duty to God: It's a Monologue, Not a Dialogue," has raised a few questions. The duty to God question is asked, the youth responds, and the board of review continues regardless of his answer... is this what is intended?

A. "It's a monologue, not a dialogue" effectively sums up the roles of youth and leader concerning any "duty to God"/higher being question during a board of review or unit leader conference. The new Boy Scout rank requirements call for a Scout to "Tell how you have done your duty to God..." It is appropriate for leaders to ask that question of a youth, but then leaders need to listen. Asking an additional question to clarify a youth's response is reasonable—or if the youth responds, "I don't know," a leader might ask a more thought-provoking question. Adult leaders should remember that Boy Scout-age youth are growing in many ways, including their religious beliefs. It is not the role of the unit leader or a board of review to evaluate how a youth goes about fulfilling his duty to God. The BSA does not seek to interpret God, higher being, or religion; interpretation is the responsibility of the Scout, his parents, and his religious leaders. However, a youth professing no belief in any higher being is not an acceptable answer with respect to the BSA advancement program. In fact, no belief whatsoever actually raises a BSA membership issue. When every youth joins the BSA his parents or quardians signed his BSA Youth Application (www.scouting.org/filestore/pdf/524-406A.pdf), acknowledging the BSA's Declaration of Religious Principle. Furthermore, the Scout Oath states a Scout observe a "duty to God," and the Scout Law includes a Scout is "reverent." If the youth professes no belief in any higher being during a board of review at any rank, the board should adjourn, provide the BSA's Declaration of Religious Principle to the Scout and his family, explain how it affects BSA membership and advancement, and allow time for the family or their religious leader to counsel the youth. The board of review can then be reconvened at a later date.



<u>Eagle Project Reviews</u> are held in conjunction with District Roundtables on the 1<sup>st</sup> Tuesday of each Month with the exception of July. Reviews begin at 7:00 p.m. Scouts seeking reviews are selected in random order, i.e. there is no reason to arrive early in order to be first in line.

Eagle candidates must be prepared to take notes during the review of their Project Proposal. Reviewers are likely to offer suggestions about the project, fundraising, leadership objectives and how to make a non-qualifying project into one that meets the tests for a satisfactory project.

No appointments will be given. Scouts should be in their fullest field uniform.

<u>Council Eagle Boards of Review</u> are held four times each month and do require an appointment.

A Scout who has in his possession an Eagle Application with his advancement record certified by our Council should make his appointment for a Board of Review as quickly as possible. If the Scout is 18 years old or older he should be encouraged to establish a Review date immediately upon receipt of Council certification.

A letter will be sent to Eagle candidates prior to their Review providing the date, time and location of their Board of Review. A list of the materials they are required to provide will be included in the letter. Scouts appearing before the Board should be in their fullest field uniform.

Every effort will be made to accommodate Scouts who have a valid, substantial reason why they are not able to attend a Project Review or Eagle Board of Review.

    - Register annually (no fee, position code 52)
      - non-unit position
      - approved by district / council advancement committee
    - Must complete separate Supernova Mentor application (form 514-017)
    - Guides the youth
      - help decide on research topics and develop a project from the selected topic
      - help identify and recruit appropriate subject matter experts (if different from mentor) SME may need to complete YPT as well
  - o For both counselors and mentors, it is suggested that you not directly work with your child, unless as part of a group who are working on the award(s)
